James 3:1-12

An outworking of a genuine faith - "a faith that works" - is controlling our mouths. (James 1:26)

2 Cor. 5:17 Not behavior modification. Newness.

Matt. 12:33-37 (gulp!)

James throws out a warning:

Teachers face greater scrutiny, so be careful. So, should we avoid teaching at all cost? Nope.

The goal is to help us understand the power of words - and the inherent risks

# BITS, BOATS & A BABY BLAZE VSS. 3-6

Each example is of a relatively tiny thing that greatly impacts something so much larger. So it is with our tongues.

If verse 6 sounds overly dramatic, consider Jeremiah 17:9

#### AN EXERCISE IN FUTILITY? VSS. 7-8

"No man can tame the tongue..."

Yet Scripture says, "Do not let any unwholesome (rotten, worthless, bad, corrupt) talk come out of your mouths..." Eph. 4:29 (Eph. 5:4)

Lies. (John 8:44) Slander and critical speech. (Rev. 12:10) Gossip. Boasting. Arrogance. Etc.

#### Our part:

#### Our prayer:

"Let the words of my mouth AND the meditations of my heart be pleasing in Your sight O Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer." Psalm 19:14
